



FIVE ACTIONS FOR THE 2014 SUMMIT

At the 2014 Nuclear Security Summit, the assembled nations should commit to eliminating weak links in the global system and support its continuous improvement with the following actions:

1. UNIVERSALIZE THE CURRENT NUCLEAR SECURITY REGIME

All elements of the existing nuclear security regime should be fully and effectively implemented by all countries.

2. PROMOTE INFORMATION SHARING TO BUILD CONFIDENCE

Sharing useful but non-sensitive data can build international confidence in nuclear security while protecting confidential information.

3. SUPPORT VOLUNTARY ACTIONS TO IMPROVE NUCLEAR SECURITY

Voluntary actions beyond legal requirements show leadership and can evolve into useful new nuclear security norms that strengthen the system.

4. USE PEER REVIEW AND CULTURALLY-SENSITIVE BEST PRACTICES

Peer reviews and best practices tailored to national needs provide confirmation of effective nuclear security performance.

5. ENDORSE A NUCLEAR SECURITY FRAMEWORK CONVENTION

A framework agreement would complement the current regime and result in a strengthened, adaptable, and sustainable system that outlasts the summit process.
